More than 8,000 articles were recovered from the Caprin boats over a period of 10 days. Most of them were small. All were stored, inventoried, and prepared for the lab.

Some made of oak, oak, white, glass, and one was a small metal tin. The tin was found with some small pieces of wood.



The investigation into the Caprin boats led to the arrest of several individuals who were involved in the boat's operation. The investigation also led to the discovery of a large amount of evidence.



The original drawings of the Caprin boats were found in the possession of one of the individuals involved in the investigation. The drawings were found in a small box.

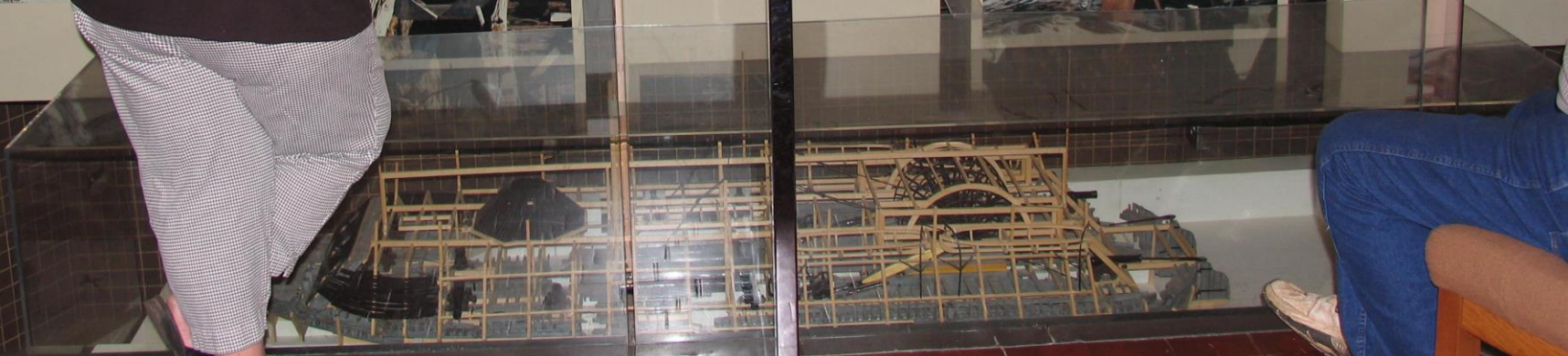
